Here the author of Science: A Four Thousand Year History and Newton: The Making of Genius uncovers a brilliant botanist and inventor who penned breathtakingly long poems explaining his theories about sex and science. But his radical views on the abolition of slavery, the education of women, and the optimistic ideals of the French Revolution invoked the ire and ridicule of the political classes and the satirists of the day. 322.
